GOSPEL TEXT

In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near."

Be sorry . . . a change in mind and planned actions

Repentance includes feeling sorry for one's personal sins, but it is much more. To repent is to take a clear-minded look at the ways in which one's life colludes with the assumptions and behaviors of the old age, to turn away from such complicity, and to turn towards God and the attitudes and actions of the realm of heaven.

LOUISE PENNY on Still Life

"The genesis of *Still Life* contains episodes of excited anticipation, others of disappointment, recollections of buried pain, and at the end of it all, joy . . . (Penny summarizes her books in a single word) . . . *duality*. People who seem to be one thing – good, bad, genial, nasty, kind, murderous – but turn out to be something else entirely – good, bad, genial, nasty, kind, murderous. (Her first book *Still Life* isn't about murder). **It's about the choices we make in our lives**.'"
