

OUTREACH FOCUS – January - ST. GEORGE'S KAMLOOPS SOCIAL MINISTRIES

"For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me clothing; I was sick and you took care of me." (Matt 25: 35)

Pennies from Heaven: At every Sunday service, just before worship starts, a collection of "spare change" is taken up in a special brass collection plate to be used for outreach during the week. This usually amounts to anywhere between \$50 – 100. The funds collected are used during the week by the Rector and two assistants on a case-by-case basis to purchase fresh food items (milk, fruit, vegetables), food gift cards, diapers, Depends, basic toiletries such as soap and toilet paper, prescriptions, bus fare or gasoline to travel to doctor's appointments, including out of town specialist appointments, over the counter medications such as children's Tylenol, cough syrup, etc. for families and individuals living in poverty. The high cost of rental accommodation in Kamloops is directly related to the need for this ministry.

A number of these families are parishioners who are struggling to make ends meet and raise their children, and others are those on the Disability Benefit who only receive \$925 to live on; usually their rent leaves them with less than \$200 a month for groceries, toiletries and medications, which is very difficult.

As well, St. George's is situated close to the Thompson River, and in the spring and summer months we have homeless people who are camped there approach us for help with food and medicine. We do not give out cash.

Food Bank Program: We operate a mini Food Bank program out of the Parish Hall. Donations of cash and non-perishables are received to stock the Food Bank. We have two small deep freezers for meat and bakery products, and two locking pantry cupboards for tinned goods, pasta, soup, cereal, etc. Donations of cash help top up the pantries when stock runs low. We keep a control log book so that we can see exactly where the food is going. The clients of this program are local neighbours struggling with chronic disease or mental illness, parishioners (in most cases, single parents) trying to feed their children, persons with disabilities, and people who have complex medical conditions that leave them with inadequate food security due to the cost of medications, travel to specialist appointments, etc. Two lay persons operate the Food Bank with guidance and oversight provided by the Rector.

Both programs are well used and those receiving assistance are very open about expressing their gratitude for the help received. These ministries complement well other social service agency sponsored and staffed programmes.
