CHRISTIAN RESOURCES MINISTRY - PARISH MINISTRIES OF ST. PAUL'S CATHEDRAL

The Christian Resources Ministry seeks to provide St. Paul's parishioners with readings in support of Christian education with seasonal material related to educational events or lectures held at St Paul's. For those wanting to explore deeper theological ideas we also have materials. As well it provides inspirational light reading in the form of novels, poetry, biographies and humour.

Most of these resources come to us from the APCI Resource Centre which we are very fortunate to have physically located at St. Paul's. Some also come from our own small collection of books. These books are to be found on a library cart located beside the

Sacristy during the week and in the parish hall on Sunday mornings. They are available to be signed out at all times that the church is open and are there for the enjoyment and enlightenment of all parishioners. Mary Dove is often available during coffee hour on Sundays to promote the library and take requests for titles for personal purchase and suggestions for additions to the library.

This Ministry is coordinated by Elizabeth Kavanagh who arranges for the exchange of books on a regular rotation based on the publication of The Circular, so that on the same day that the Circular comes out, new books are on the cart. An average of 80 to 100 titles are circulated a year. Elizabeth is also the one who will pursue delinquent borrowers, but we are very lenient, and our loan periods are long. We do ask you try not to forget that you have a book so that others may share your enjoyment. We also ask that you sign your name, telephone number and the date you are borrowing so we do not lose any resources. We can try to arrange for you to acquire your own copy of anything of which you are particularly fond .

In addition to the titles on the cart we are able to access the APCI Resource Centre itself on Fridays. Mary and Gordon would love to have you come and visit and take time to browse the 1500 books. They will also help you buy any requests you might have, often at a discount. From time to time a number of devotional materials are made available for purchase.

This ministry has no formal structure, no meetings, no agenda or minutes, no formal reports, budgets or financial statements. Elizabeth Kavanagh is the official St Paul's liaison with the APCI Resource Centre and consults on an ad hoc basis with Mary and Gordon.

ASSEMBLY 2019 QUESNEL/BARKERVILLE BC: An overview

Notwithstanding the statement from Bishop Barbara below, several members of St. Paul's were present at assembly 2019 last weekend. Your delegates included Dean Ken, Barry Baskin and Joan Lukow who have contributed to the notes below. If you have questions, please seek them out. In a nutshell

- We were hosted brilliantly by the Parish of St. John the Divine, Quesnel with other members of the Caribou Region
- We travelled to Barkerville to celebrate the 150th Anniversary of St. Saviour's (Gold Rush) Church followed by dinner and theatre on Saturday evening
- We were blessed with the presence of Primate Fred Hiltz, Bishop Mary Irwin-Gibson of the Diocese of Montreal and other special guests

- The Bishop's Charge was received and will be made available in due course
- The Assembly approved the Policy allowing us to elect our next bishop
- We reviewed an interim Territory Profile which will be made public in a few weeks' time
- We viewed the Anglican Video production *Journeying Together In Faith* which chronicles the progression from the Diocese of Caribou, through the Anglican Parishes of the Central Interior through to becoming the Territory of the People. We will arrange for a screening of this fine documentary in due course
- We elected a number of folks to positions including Joan Lukow who now serves on Coordinating Council with the Dean and others
- We received a variety of reports including financial statements. Most importantly we became aware of the need to cultivate the next generation of lay and clergy leaders and to be intentional in prayer for leaders to be identified, trained, equipped and supported
- We heard from our Partner Diocese of Montreal with whom we continue to journey together
- We heard a detailed synopsis of the work coming before General Synod in July in Vancouver from the Primate. We also participated in *The Heartbeat of the Church*, a listening and sharing initiative facilitated by the Primate. We plan to do something similar in the fall
- The Primate offered special recognition to Melissa Green and Bishops Gordon Light and Barbara Andrews
- Many gifts were given and received, too many to name here
- Finally, the statement below speaks for itself. It was given at the close of Sunday morning worship which brought the assembly to its close

RETIREMENT OF BISHOP BARBARA ANDREWS: AN ASSEMBLY 2019 ANNOUNCEMENT

My dear Friends: On Oct 18 of this year, I will celebrate the tenth anniversary of my ordination as your Bishop. I have loved being your Bishop – it has been for me both the most humbling experience and the greatest privilege to serve with many fine clergy and lay leaders over this past ten years. I have loved each of my parish visits in times of great joy, and even in times of sadness and struggle, as we always worked together to find a way forward.

When God called me to be among you as your Bishop, I envisioned a much different ministry, but I found my role was to give leadership to a process of moving the Anglican

Parishes of the Central Interior from under the umbrella of the Province of BC & Yukon to becoming once again an Anglican Identity with the rights and responsibilities of a diocese. During my episcopal ministry, in my visits with each parish and to the many gatherings we held, I learnt some important truths about the people who God had gifted me to share in ministry with.

The first truth is the deep commitment to be the family of God despite the horrors of our history, and along with your deep commitment to walk together to healing and reconciliation has been paramount in your sharing with me – you were prepared to give up all to stay in the family of God here in this place.

The Second truth was your desire for the right to elect your own Bishop under your terms.

The Third truth, you knew you needed to embrace new ways of being church and doing the mission of God in this place. I witnessed how faithful you were in prayer, allowing the Holy Spirit to take you on a journey that brought us here to today. As you moved to becoming the Territory of the People, you held firmly to your commitments, made right here in Quesnel in 2000 as you let go of the Diocese of Cariboo. You held firmly to the affirmations you adopted as you became the Anglican Parishes of the Central Interior, and I believe you have been able to maintain the best of who you have been and are as you walk together into a hope filled future.

I have a deep sense that God is calling me to retirement as Bishop, now that we have completed this part of the journey together. Coordinating Council this morning has made way for me to retire and to begin the process of electing a new bishop over the summer and it is my prayer that on September 28th, you will gather to elect your new Bishop. With this in mind, early today, I sent a letter to the Metropolitan, stating my intention to retire at the end of 2019.

Retirement for me has many exciting possibilities and I will take time to discover them. However, what I will miss most in retirement is the privilege of sharing in ministry with an outstanding team of clergy and laity who have been courageous in finding new ways to be God's people as the Territory of the People. I pray you will live into your theme for this Assembly, as you go forward to build, renew and strengthen by walking together in unity.
